B. Volunteer Recognition

8 Reports and Presentations

A. Health Insurance Consultants Report
Dr. Nagle introduced Mr. Millet from the firm of Bouchey and
Clark Benefits, Inc. Mr. Millet gave an overview of information
within the report, including a series of recommendations.

Mr. Millet noted that the experience of East Greenbush Central School District within the RCG Trust has been favorable, resulting in a surplus. In some years, the surplus generated by East Greenbush covered the deficits of other schools. He said that the District is experiencing escalating prescription plan costs under a self-funded plan. Mr. Millet expressed concern with the District's

lack of influence and control over RCG Trust operations in light of its approximate 15% of the total Trust enrollment.

Mr. <u>Millet</u> provided a series of recommendations. He said that each recommendation has benefits and risks in the areas of control, savings, and rate stability. Mr. <u>Millet</u> suggested that all recommendations be simultaneously pursued. He advised that the possibility of leaving the RCG Trust should not be taken lightly. The 180 day notice and July 1, 2017 renewal date provisions were explained. Mr. <u>Millet</u> noted the options could be pursued from now until December 2016. He commented on the option to stay with the Trust and hold a trustee position. The seven trustee terms of office are staggered, with the potential for a June election.

Mr. Millet said the high rate increases with the prescription drug plan were also experienced by other school districts. He spoke about the NY44 Trust option, noting the savings are too large to ignore, although there is some concern with rate stability. Further, Mr. Millet shared the District's size make it a candidate to stand on its own with a potential plan through Empire Blue Cross/Blue Shield. The potential plan is a minimum premium arrangement that allows risks to come into play.

Mr. <u>Dunn</u> said the report was a lot to digest and the Board would need greater time to think about the recommendations. He asked if the NY44 Plan has greater rate increases over time. Mr. <u>Millet</u> responded that the NY44 Trust is growing by moving into eastern New York. The western part of the State has seen greater rate stability. He said that due to network issues, the Plan has split some rating regions. While the eastern part of the state had an approximate 10% rate increase, the other regions had an 18% rate increase. As the Plan is maturing, it is responding to cost pressures.

Mr. Mann suggested the report recommendations be revisited at the next meeting.

Dr. <u>Nagle</u> said that two RCG trustee positions are open at this time, and two incumbents are rerunning for their seats. Mr. <u>Mann</u> asked for information on the deadline. Ms. <u>Maciol</u> also suggested the report be revisited at the next meeting.
