2019-20 School Budget Maintains All Programs and Stays Below Tax Cap

On May 21, District residents will vote on the \$95.9 million proposed school budget. The proposed budget, which has an increase of 1.76% from last year, would maintain all current programs. Due to enrollment projections and to ensure manageable class sizes, three additional classroom teachers, a social worker and a .5 Academic Intervention Services teacher will be added.

The proposed budget has a tax levy increase of 3.69%, which is below the state tax cap of 4.84% that applies to East Greenbush for 2019-20.

In addition to the school budget, residents will vote on the replacement of eight school buses, which will be fully paid for by the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund.

District Graduation Rate Ranks 2nd in Capital Region

East Greenbush Central School District's four-year graduation rate remained at 95% in 2018, giving it the second highest graduation rate of all school districts in the Capital Region, according to NYS Education Department data.

"We continue to be proud of the exceptional accomplishments of our students, teachers, administrators and support staff," said Superintendent Jeff Simons. "The positive vision of our Board of Education and the strong level of community support we receive from our families enables our educators to continue to help our students soar."



The District continues to outperform the rest of the state by a large margin, which had a 80.4% graduation rate in 2018.

Other bright spots for East Greenbush CSD included an increase in Regents Diplomas with Advanced Designation and students with disabilities had an 87% graduation rate (5 point improvement from previous year).

Who creates the school budget?

School administrators develop a budget in coordination with the Budget Review and Advisory Committee, the Board of Education and members of the community. The Board adopts the proposed budget and submits it for voter approval.

What ongoing strategies does the district use to contain costs?

East Greenbush has instituted a number of changes to reduce costs district-wide. Some examples include:

- Contract settlements with major unions including CSEA, SRP, EGTA and EGAA increased co-pays on prescriptions and employee contributions toward health insurance, helping the district to realize nearly \$1,741,261 in savings in healthcare costs.
- Participation in an energy conservation program for the last 11 years saved an estimated \$4.3 million.
- Self-insurance for workers compensation and dental insurance.
- Reduced printed newsletters and correspondence in favor of low-cost digital communication.
- Use of Bus Purchase Reserve Fund approved by voters in 2010 to acquire new buses totaling \$4.4 million and avoiding interest payments. Voters approved creation of a new fund in 2018.

If the tax levy increases by 3.69%, does that mean my tax bill will increase by 3.69%?

Not necessarily. Your tax bill is based on a number of factors outside the control of the school district – such as your home’s assessment, equalization rates, the total assessment base, property exemptions and STAR savings.

What happens if the budget is defeated?

If voters do not approve the budget on May 21, the Board of Education has 3 options:

1. Present the same budget to voters on the statewide Budget Re-Vote Day, June 18
2. Present a modified budget to voters on Budget Re-Vote Day
3. Adopt a contingency budget

If the budget is again defeated on June 18, the Board is required to adopt a contingency budget.

What are the requirements of a contingency budget?

Under contingency budget rules, the district will need to remove all non-contingent items from the proposed budget, such as certain equipment and unreimbursed community use of facilities. Certain contingent, but non-mandated expenses may also be affected, for example, interscholastic athletics; co-curricular activities; art, music and physical education for grades K-6; and library services.

A contingency budget would require the budget be reduced by an additional \$2 million. All state-mandated programs, whether funded by state aid or not, would need to be retained.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2019-2020 by the qualified voters of the East Greenbush Central School District, Rensselaer & Columbia Counties, New York, will be held at D.P. Sutherland, Green Meadow, Bell Top and Howard L. Goff Schools in said district on Tuesday, May 21, 2019 between the hours of 7:00am and 9:00pm, prevailing time in the above mentioned schools, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot or machine.

Voter Propositions on the May 21 Ballot

Proposition No. 1 (Budget)

RESOLVED; That the operating budget, in the amount of \$95,925,684 as proposed by the Board of Education, be adopted for the school fiscal year 2019 – 2020 and the levy of taxes be assessed therefore in accordance with law.

Proposition No. 2 (School Buses)

RESOLVED;(a) That the Board of Education of the East Greenbush Central School District, in the Counties of Rensselaer and Columbia, New York (the “District”), is hereby authorized to purchase various school buses and to expend therefore, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, an amount not to exceed the estimated total cost of \$702,780;(b) that the Board of Education is hereby authorized to expend \$702,780 for the vehicles referred to herein from the District’s “Bus Purchase Reserve Fund” which was established pursuant to voter approval on May 15, 2018; and (c) that the Board of Education is hereby further authorized to deposit in the District’s “Bus Purchase Reserve Fund” an amount up to 100% of any State Aid received in any year with respect to the purchase of vehicles.



Bus Purchases from Reserve Fund

In addition to the school budget, voters will decide on the replacement of eight school buses, which will be fully paid for by the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund with no impact to taxpayers. The Bus Purchase Reserve Fund acts like a savings account, allowing the district to store money for the sole purpose of purchasing buses. It also helps the district avoid the costs that come with borrowing.

New York State will reimburse the District for **64.1%** of the total bus purchase.

Why are we purchasing new buses?

To maintain the highest degree of safety for our students and drivers, better fuel efficiency, lower emissions and low repair costs.

How do you decide which buses to replace?

Several factors are taken into consideration, including: industry standards, total mileage, body condition and repair expenses over time. Normally, small buses have an expected life of 8 to 10 years while larger buses may last 12 to 15 years.

What is the cost to taxpayers for Propositions 2?

There is no impact to taxpayers for Proposition 2 because the purchases will be made out of the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund.

Are there any rebates or refunds for these bus purchases?

Yes. New York State will reimburse the District for 64.1% of the total bus purchase. These funds will be deposited in the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund, which was approved by voters in 2018.

Columbia and Siena College Sign Early Assurance MBA Agreement

A new agreement with Siena College will allow Columbia students to apply for admission to an Early Assurance Program as early as the 10th grade. After meeting the course requirements at Columbia, students will have the opportunity to enroll at Siena on pace to earn a bachelor of science in business degree, then an MBA, all within four years.

The agreement was signed last month by Jeffrey Simons, superintendent of schools for the East Greenbush Central School District, and Br. F. Edward Coughlin, O.F.M., Ph.D., president of Siena College.

“This new partnership with Siena College provides just what we’ve been looking for and what our students need,” Mr. Simons said. “This arrangement provides a seamless

pathway that begins in high school and leads to a Master’s Degree from an exceptional college and an exciting career in business. This is a win-win for our district, the college, our students and our families!”

Eligible students may apply for the program during their sophomore or junior year at Columbia based on their past and projected academic performance. Students will need to submit an application, essay and transcript to Siena, and must be on track to complete a required number of academic units in English, social studies, mathematics, laboratory science and language.

Students who are accepted to the early assurance business program will not be required to enroll at Siena or to forgo application to other schools; rather they will be able to secure their admission and reserve a place at Siena.

This agreement with Siena follows East Greenbush Central School District’s emphasized focus on college and career preparation. The district has added more college-level courses in recent years, now totaling 22 college-level courses. It also added a new diploma certificate program in Business Administration last summer and formed a new Business Advisory Council with local colleges, businesses and industry leaders to review employment trends, examine skills needed for success and develop strategies to inform students and parents of post-graduation opportunities.

“The board is pleased to be able to support our district’s partnership with Siena College and this new opportunity for our students,” said Michael Buono, president of the East Greenbush Central School District Board of Education. “It continues our district’s goals of maintaining academic excellence and continuing to build educational and strategic partnerships. I want to thank Siena College and our district staff for all their work in bringing this together!”

During the internship, they attend astronomy lectures and star parties, and they have both received their own telescopes as part of the program.

“It’s really cool,” Krulikowski said. “The first day we got to build our own telescopes and if you complete the internship, you get to keep it. The teacher shows us how to find planets, star clusters, galaxies and ring nebulas.”

Krulikowski and Mrs. Roohan brought their new knowledge of outer space to Goff Middle School earlier this spring when they hosted a star party for East Greenbush students, families and community members.

Voting Information

VOTER REGISTRATION:

You are already registered to vote if you have voted in a school election within the last 4 years (or are registered with the County Board of Elections). To register:

- Go to the Office of the District Clerk, 29 Englewood Avenue, East Greenbush, from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on regular days of business
- Bring photo ID with a current address
- If you have moved, also bring other means of residential identification, such as a utility bill, phone bill or other official document

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS:

- Age 18 or older
- U.S. Citizen
- Registered to vote
- Resident of the district for at least 30 days prior to the vote

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT:

Qualified district residents who are unable to go to the polls may cast their votes by absentee ballot. An application is required first and may be obtained by calling the District Office at 518-207-2535. Applications are also available on the District's website at www.egcsd.org. The due date for applications is Tuesday, May 14, 2019 if received by mail or Monday, May 20, 2019 if received in person at the District Office.

Once a completed application is approved, an absentee ballot is issued to the voter; it must be returned to the District Clerk's Office by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, 2019. Note that individuals designated as permanently disabled by the Rensselaer County Board of Elections will automatically receive an absentee ballot.
